CURRICULUM DAY

SCHOOL PHOTOS

INDIVIDUAL EDUCATION PLANS (IEP)

UNIFORM

Just a reminder that students are required to wear the correct school uniform to school. It demonstrates a respect for our school and its values. We ask your support with this matter.

COVID-19 UPDATE

As you are probably aware, in line with advice from the Chief Health Officer, the Victorian Government has announced that all Victorians must wear a face covering when they leave home from 11.59 pm on Sunday 2 August, 2020.

Face coverings will be mandatory for people aged 12 and over. These measures will slow the spread of COVID-19 and help protect the community.

In schools, this means that school-based staff and secondary school students will be required to wear a face covering. The Victorian Chief Health Officer has advised that any face covering will be acceptable - it does not need to be a surgical mask.

Students who attend primary school, including those aged 12 by Year 6, will not be required to wear a face covering. The Chief Health Officer has advised that it is not practical to require some primary school students to wear face coverings while others are not required to. Students or staff who have a medical condition - including problems with their breathing, a serious skin

condition on the face, a disability or a mental health condition - are not required to wear a face covering.

Guidance for schools

All school-based staff must wear face coverings at school and when travelling to and from school.

Teachers and education support staff will not be required to wear face coverings while teaching, but those who wish to do so can.

Teachers should wear face coverings in other areas of the school when not teaching (for example, in the staffroom, on yard duty, and when providing first aid or taking temperatures) and when travelling to and from school.

Parents/carers will be required to wear face coverings whenever they leave the house, including for school drop-off and pick-up.

Our staff will work through this information with their students tomorrow and we look for your support to discuss this with your children


AROUND THE SCHOOL **GRADE 5/6 LEARNING**

In Literacy, Grade 5/6 students have been monitoring their reading. They have been learning about the characteristics of non-fiction texts such as glossary, content page, captions, photographs, diagrams, tables etc. Students are in the process of collecting information for their next Information Report. They have been learning new research skills and how to note take.

In Mathematics, students have been learning Order of Operations (PEMDAS) and collecting data and representing it in a variety of ways.

In Integrated Studies, students have evaluated their petri dishes, observing the growth of bacteria. Students have also been learning about the continents of the world and labelling the countries on map.







Grade 3 / 4

This week in Grade 3 /4 we have continued to look at the genre of procedure writing. The Grade 3's created Harmonicas out of icy pole sticks, rubber bands and paper.





While the Grade 4's typed up their favourite meals, snacks or desserts into recipes to create a class recipe book!



In Maths, our study of Subtraction is coming to end and we will be moving our focus to the topic of Money. Students will be involved in making purchases, calculating change and identifying other currencies from around the world.

For Integrated Studies this week Grade 4 students looked at the flags that represent us as Victorians, these included the Australian Flag, Victorian Flag, Indigenous Flag and Torres Strait Islander Flag. We focused on the key features of each flag and what they represent. In groups, we then recreated the 4 flags using collage techniques.



The Grade 3 students continued to look at the Local History of Shepparton. Students were engaged in finding

and learning about the Heritage Buildings around the Greater Shepparton Region.

Grade 1/2 Miss Larcombe

What a super week of learning we have had.

In our reading we are learning to be a great coach to our partner. This means helping them when they get to a hard word or when the reading doesn't sound right. Students spend 5 minutes each, reading aloud levelled books to their partner. We have loved this time in the classroom and students look forward to listening to their partner read.

Sentence starters include

"Check the first letter"

"Why don't we jump over the word"

"That didn't sound right, let's try that again"

"I can see a word in there"

These are great prompts to be using at home also, for all levels of reading.

After this, we build our reading stamina. Any thing in the Book Boxes can be read during this time. It is a quiet time where we can really engage in the love of literature.


From our reading there are three words that we practice for the week as our vocabulary focus. Previously we have learnt to read, spell and use in a sentence.


Victoria, Australia, country, city, gold, discovery, play, place and Platypus.


Ask your child at home and see if they can remember the spelling and can use it in a sentence.

Grade 1 /2 Mr Kirby

This week in grade 1-2 Kirby, we continue to travel around Australia. We departed Victoria and are on our way to NSW!

So far we have stopped at Gundagai and learnt all about the 'Dog on the tuckerbox', seen some friendly Platypus in streams through the Blue Mountains and are soon to stop by and climb the Sydney Harbour Bridge and check out the opera house!

We look forward to sharing about our next destination!

ART

In Visual Arts, Foundation students discussed Henri Rousseau's jungle scenes. They looked at the detail of leaves and drew their observations. They examined the colours within the leaves and have created their own leaf using grey-lead and oil pastels.

The students in Grade 1/2 are studying the artistic style of Chagall. After discussing his paintings with curved horizon lines, they are now responding by creating oil pastel drawings of a village landscape.

The Grade 3 students are comparing the artistic style of Gauguin and Rousseau. They discussed the tropical landscapes of Gauguin with an emphasis on foreground, middle-ground and background. They used the vegetation in Rousseau's paintings as inspiration for their own landscape which they will create using water soluble oil pastels.

Students in Grade 4 explored Pablo Picasso's use of animals as symbols. They have discussed Picasso's 'The Rooster of the Liberation' as a symbol of a new beginning. In response to these discussions the students are producing soft pastel drawings of roosters.

Grade 5/6 students discussed the variety of styles of Pablo Picasso with an emphasis on his abstract portraits. In response to these discussions, the students are drawing outlines of their own faces and will apply patterns and colours to create a cubist style selfportrait.

Foundation Learning

This week our Big Books have been The Fantastic Cake and Mrs Wishy-Washy on TV. They have been used to model strategies to solve tricky words. Explicit teaching of putting your finger on the first letter, checking if it is a sight word and the importance of reading the picture for clues have been taught. On Wednesday the children loved making and designing a layered fantastic cake using sliced up coloured kinder squares. They then wrote sight words that we found in the text of this book.

The children have continued to enjoy learning about special landmarks of Australia and admired the beautiful photos we found of the Sydney Opera House. We also viewed a "Learn How to Draw" of this amazing structure but it was oh so challenging. Did you know that it was designed on the idea that it would looks like sails of a ship?

We have been counting by 5s to 100 using the Scratch Garden video to consolidate this skill, as well as a little introduction to counting by 100s to 1000!! Recording our count is also important to assist in bringing our number formations to fluency. Number reversals are still providing a challenge from some.

Songs that are proving popular are G'day G'day by Slim Dusty, I am Australian by the Seekers and the National sing-along by kids in isolation | ABC Australia. Singing is such a lovely way to come together and celebrate our time at school!

COVID -19 PROCEDURES
